# STEP 1. LEARN ABOUT DIFFERENT KINDS OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

### NON-PROFIT HOUSING

Non-profit affordable housing developments offer well-designed and professionally-managed homes. Tenants are carefully screened and eligibility requirements may vary. Find out more by calling and visiting non-profit developer websites.

## **SECTION 8 (HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHER PROGRAM)**

This federally-funded program helps close the gap between rent and your income. It's difficult to obtain a Section 8 voucher, but contact your local public housing authority to get on the waiting list.

### **PUBLIC HOUSING**

Public housing has certain income and residency restrictions. Contact your local public housing authority.

### AFFORDABLE HOMEOWNERSHIP

When buying a home, contact your city's housing department and homebuyer assistance programs. Struggling with mortgage payments? See the foreclosure counseling resources in this brochure.

# GENERAL HOUSING & TENANTS RIGHTS ASSISTANCE

If you need help with a security deposit, rent payments, emergency housing or shelter, or tenant/landlord issues, contact the "housing, shelter, and emergency resources" organizations.

# STEP 2. GET YOUR FINANCES AND CREDIT READY

### **CREDIT CHECK**

Obtain your credit report early. Be prepared to tell prospective landlords about any problems and the steps you've taken to address them. Some landlords may accept a poor credit history if you have good references and can offer proof of employment, a higher security deposit, or a co-signer. If you need help, contact a credit-counseling agency.

### INCOME AND BUDGETING

Ideally, your housing costs should be no more than one-third of your income. Some agencies can help you create a financial plan so you can afford transportation, childcare, health care and other expenses as well as rent or mortgage payments.

# STEP 3. CHECK TO SEE IF YOUR INCOME QUALIFIES

Affordable housing is reserved for people with lower incomes. Find out if you qualify by inquiring with a specific property or non-profit developer. If you have a Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher, ask if the property will accept it.

# STEP 4. IDENTIFY YOUR HOUSING NEEDS AND PREFERENCES

Think about the location and the amenities that are best for you, but also be flexible. Consider several cities and types of housing to increase your chances of finding the right place. Non-profit housing is often targeted for specific populations: Seniors, Special Needs, Family and Transitional or Supportive. Housing providers cannot discriminate based on race, ethnicity, gender, national origin, family status, or other protected classes. If you're undocumented or have a criminal record, you may encounter challenges. The housing organizations listed here can inform you about your options.

# STEP 5. CONTACT NON-PROFIT HOUSING ORGANIZATIONS AND APPLY

There is no single source of information about affordable housing. But by contacting many organizations and agencies, you may discover some great places and increase your chances of finding an affordable home.

- Check the websites of non-profit developers often.
- Get on as many waitlists as you can.
   When a waitlist opens, call the property.
   Complete and submit applications by the deadline.
- For properties under construction, ask to be added to the interest list.
- Once you've submitted applications or joined a waitlist, let each property know if you move or change your phone number. In order to remain on a waitlist, you must be in regular contact with the site manager of each property. Ask about the best way to keep in contact.
